Monthly Market Commentary

August was another good month for NAVF and the Japanese stock market generally, with the TOPIX up 4.5% and the Nikkei 225 better by 4%. Over the course of the month, some of our largest holdings performed very well, particularly Eiken Chemical (+10%), Aska Pharmaceutical (+8%), Hogy Medical (+7%), and Meisei Industrial (+5%). It was not all plain sailing though, with Bunka Shutter losing around 11.5% and Fuji Media Holdings doing very little, despite all eyes being focused on the new management team.

Aska Pharmaceutical chose to publicise its concern at the size of NAVF and its affiliates' position in the stock, collectively now over 21% of outstanding. It has threatened to introduce a 'poison pill' to disenfranchise us from voting at any general meetings. We continue to strive for a constructive dialogue with the company - as we do with all our portfolio holdings.

It has been gratifying to periodically be trading at a premium to NAV, which has allowed several small tap issuances to satisfy demand. This additional capital enables the fund to add to existing positions, to better leverage our engagements and also selectively pursue additional opportunities - which there are plenty of amongst Japanese listed companies. The size of the fund, started at £103 million in February 2020, now exceeds £420 million. Onwards and upwards!
